


# FEBRUARY 2026 REVIEW

Monthly Clients Served 9 Month Trend



**WORK RELEASE UPDATES:**

There are presently 40 work release residents: 30 males and 10 females. The Work Release Facility is currently at 77% capacity, 75% capacity for males and 83% capacity for females.

**JANUARY OVERVIEW:**

Community Corrections served a total of 173 clients in January: 51 via the Work Release Program and 122 via the Home Detention/Electronic Monitoring Program for a total of 5,173 days supervised. It is noted that 17

clients were transferred to other jurisdictions for supervision. The average daily Work Release Population was 44, while the average for Home Detention was 122.


The department received 18 new clients in January, a 38% decrease:

- 13 Level 6 Felonies
- 4 High Level Felonies (Lvl 5 & Above)
- 0 Criminal Misdemeanors
- 1 Juvenile GPS Supervision

23 clients successfully completed the program, while 8 clients were returned to either the Cass or Pulaski County Jail on a pending violation, with 12 held in the CCJ on pending violations.



**POPULATION ANALYSIS:**


- 51 Work Release Clients
- 122 Home Detention Clients
- Approximately 15 Clients participated in Work Crew; working on various projects
- 13 CTP Clients
- 12 Courtesy Transfers
- 143 clients were serving a term originating from Cass County, while 25 were serving a sentence from Pulaski County
- 4 clients participated in Juvenile GPS Monitoring

At the direction of our local JRAC, the agency is now tracking the following performance metrics.




**RISK & OFFENSE TYPE ANALYSIS:**

Risk Analysis: Analysis shows that 21% of clients served in January were identified through the IRAS Community Supervision Tool as High Risk to Very High Risk, 46% as Moderate Risk, and 33% as Low Risk.


Offense Type Analysis:

Analysis shows that 38% of offenses are drug and alcohol related, 14% are traffic offenses, 18% are crimes against persons, 11% property related, 4% weapon related, 7% public health and admin., and 8% fall into the other category.




**DRUG SCREEN ANALYSIS:**


Out of 169 drugs screens administered this month, 8% were positive. The majority of positive screens were for THC, Methamphetamine, and Opiates.



**Violation Rate:** the percentage of clients who received a violation; pending violations are NOT included; this is a measure of closed cases.



**Safety Rate:** the percentage of clients who do not commit a new offense while under supervision; this is a measure of closed cases.




**Completion Rate:** the percentage of clients who remain under supervision until the end of their sentence.



**Drug Screen Positivity Rate:** the percentage of drug screens administered that return a positive result

**NOTABLE UPDATES:**

- Scheduled to begin the Justice System Partners (JSP) Coaching Certification in late March, early April.
- Will begin using Sprout, the AI case management system currently used by Pretrial Services, to increase efficiency and intentionally coach staff in the Coaching Model, Motivational Interviewing (MI), Effective Case Management Strategies (ECMS), skill-building, and Trauma-Informed Care (TIC).
