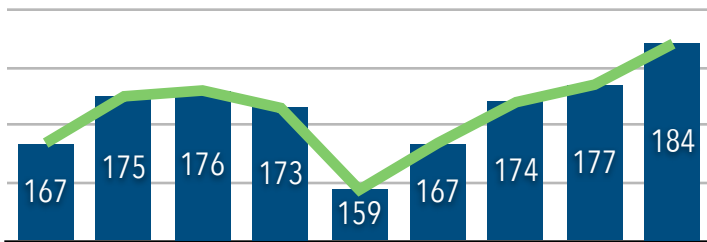

WORK RELEASE UPDATES:

The Work Release Facility currently houses 29 residents, including 25 males and 4 females, and is operating at 56% of overall capacity, representing a 5% decrease from the previous month. The male dorm is operating at 69% capacity, while the female dorm is operating at 33% capacity, providing available bed space for future placements.

JUNE OVERVIEW:

In June, Community Corrections served 184 clients, a 4% increase over the previous month. This included 44 clients participating in the Work Release Program and 140 clients supervised through the Home Detention/Electronic Monitoring Program, accounting for a combined 5,150 days supervised. In addition, 21 clients were transferred to other jurisdictions for supervision.

The average daily population was 29 in Work Release and 136 in Home Detention, reflecting continued reliance on community-based supervision as an alternative to post-conviction incarceration.

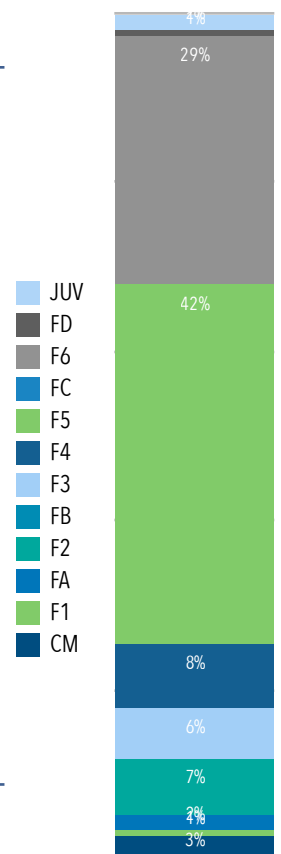
The department received 24 new clients in June:

- 8 Level 6 Felonies
- 11 High Level Felonies (Lvl 5 & Above)
- 3 Criminal Misdemeanors
- 2 Juvenile GPS Supervision

This month, 24 clients successfully completed Community Corrections supervision, demonstrating continued progress toward successful reintegration and accountability. Conversely, 11 clients were returned to the Cass or Pulaski County Jail on alleged program violations. Of those individuals, 10 remain detained in the Cass County Jail pending court disposition.

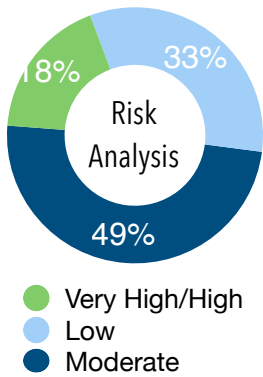

POPULATION ANALYSIS:

- 44 Work Release Clients
- 140 Home Detention Clients
- Approximately 15 Clients participated in Work Crew; working on various projects
- 13 CTP Clients
- 21 Courtesy Transfers
- 144 clients were serving a term originating from Cass County, while 35 were serving a sentence from Pulaski County
- 4 clients participated in Juvenile GPS Monitoring

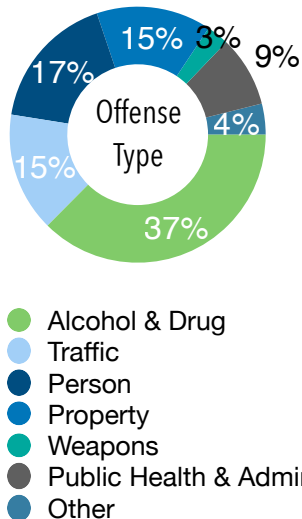


RISK & OFFENSE TYPE ANALYSIS:

Risk Analysis: Analysis shows that 18% of clients served in June were identified through the IRAS Community Supervision Tool as High Risk to Very High Risk, 49% as Moderate Risk, and 33% as Low Risk.

Offense Type Analysis:

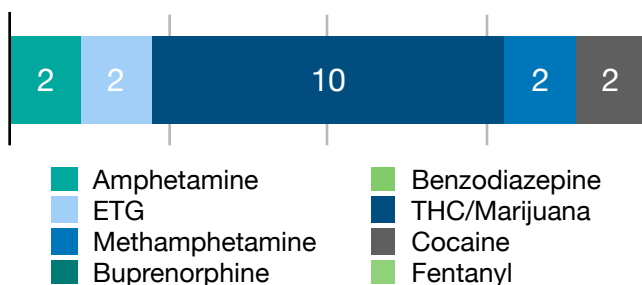
Analysis shows that 37% of offenses are drug and alcohol related, 15% are traffic offenses, 17% are crimes against persons, 15% property related, 3% weapon related, 9% public health and admin., and 4% fall into the other category.



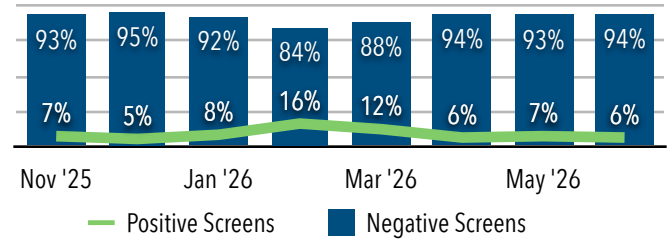
DRUG SCREEN ANALYSIS:

Out of 212 drug screens administered this month, 6% were positive. The majority of positive screens were for THC & ETG (Alcohol).

Positive Screens by Drug

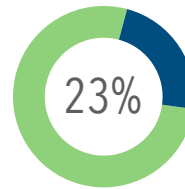


Percent Positive Screens 8 Month Trend

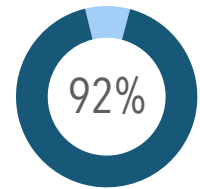


PERFORMANCE METRICS:

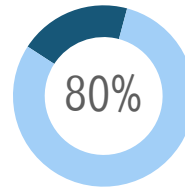
At the direction of our local JRAC, the agency is now tracking the following performance metrics.



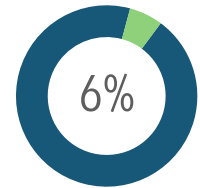
Violation Rate: the percentage of clients who received a violation; pending violations are NOT included; this is a measure of closed cases.



Safety Rate: the percentage of clients who do not commit a new offense while under supervision; this is a measure of closed cases.



Completion Rate: the percentage of clients who remain under supervision until the end of their sentence.



Drug Screen Positivity Rate: the percentage of drug screens administered that return a positive result

NOTABLE UPDATES:

- 2027 IDOC Community Corrections grant awards have been announced, with the agency receiving \$671,956.
- The 2027 departmental budget has been submitted, and the annual Cost Savings and Community Impact Report will be released soon.
- Work continues on the soft launch of the Journeys AI Notetaker and Justice System Partners (JSP) Coaching Certification Program, with full implementation scheduled for August 1.
