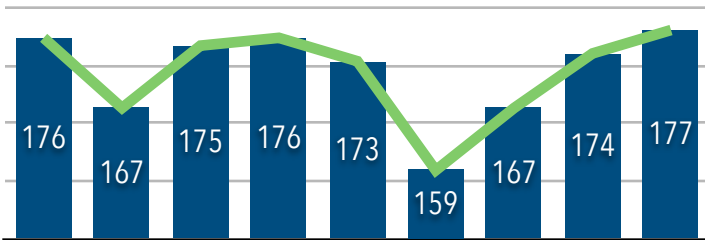

Monthly Clients Served 9 Month Trend

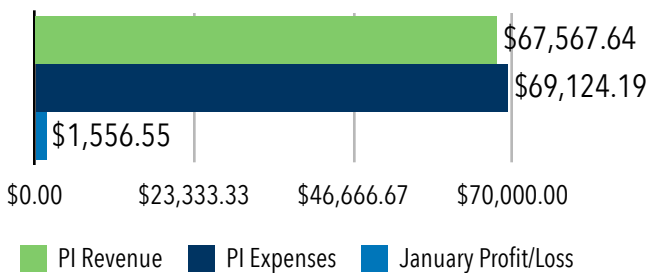

WORK RELEASE UPDATES:

There are presently 31 work release residents: 27 males and 4 females. The Work Release Facility is currently at 59% capacity, 67% capacity for males and 33% capacity for females.

MAY OVERVIEW:

Community Corrections served a total of 177 clients in May including 44 through the Work Release Program and 133 through the Home Detention/Electronic Monitoring Program, for a total of 5,201 supervision

days. It is noted that 23 clients were transferred to other jurisdictions for supervision. The average daily Work Release Population was 35, while the average for Home Detention was 131.

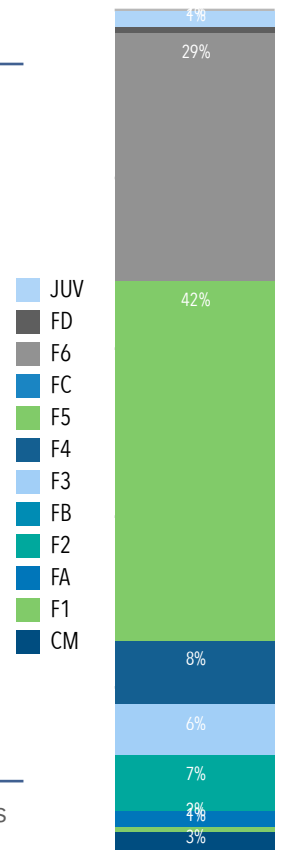
The department received 24 new clients in May:

- 7 Level 6 Felonies
- 10 High Level Felonies (Lvl 5 & Above)
- 5 Criminal Misdemeanors
- 2 Juvenile GPS Supervision

15 clients successfully completed the program. Six client were returned to either the Cass or Pulaski County Jail on a pending violation, with 10 currently held in the CCJ on pending violations and two in treatment.

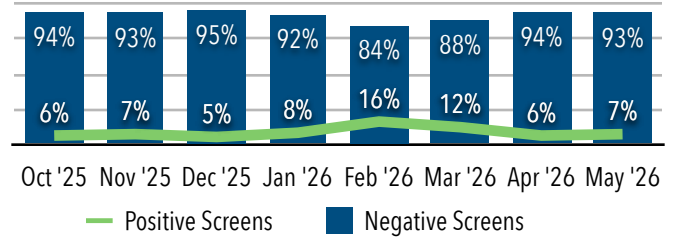

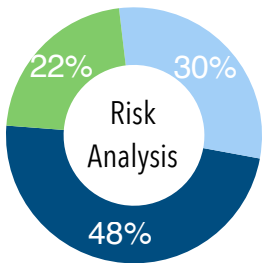
POPULATION ANALYSIS:

- 44 Work Release Clients
- 133 Home Detention Clients
- Approximately 15 Clients participated in Work Crew; working on various projects
- 15 CTP Clients
- 23 Courtesy Transfers
- 141 clients were serving a term originating from Cass County, a 7% decrease, while 31 were serving a sentence from Pulaski County
- 3 clients participated in Juvenile GPS Monitoring

RISK & OFFENSE TYPE ANALYSIS:

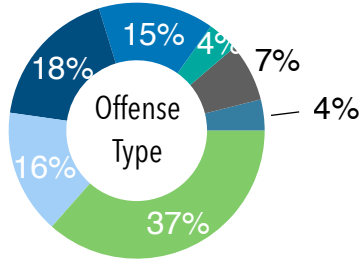


- Very High/High

Risk Analysis: Analysis shows that 22% of clients served in May were identified through the IRAS Community Supervision Tool as High Risk to Very High Risk, 48% as Moderate Risk, and 30% as Low Risk.

Offense Type Analysis:

Analysis shows that 37% of offenses are drug and alcohol related, 18% are traffic offenses, 16% are crimes against persons, 15% property related, 4% weapon related, 7% public health and admin., and 4% fall into the other category.

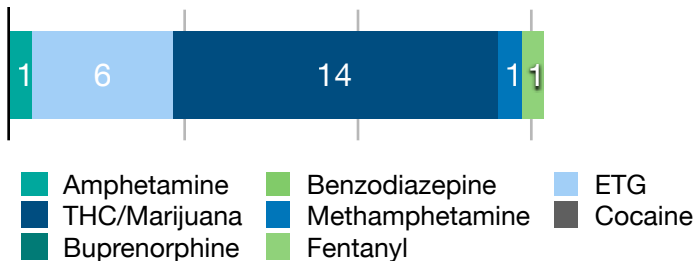

DRUG SCREEN ANALYSIS:

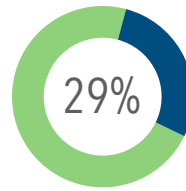
Out of 238 drug screens administered this month, 7% were positive. The majority of positive screens were for THC &

ETG. THC increased 50%. Positive Screens by Drug

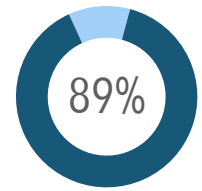


PERFORMANCE METRICS:

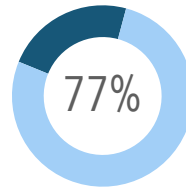
At the direction of our local JRAC, the agency is now tracking the following performance metrics.



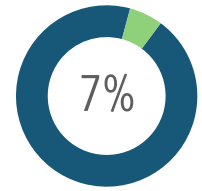
Violation Rate: the percentage of clients who received a violation; pending violations are NOT included; this is a measure of closed cases.



Safety Rate: the percentage of clients who do not commit a new offense while under supervision; this is a measure of closed cases.



Completion Rate: the percentage of clients who remain under supervision until the end of their sentence.



Drug Screen Positivity Rate: the percentage of drug screens administered that return a positive result

NOTABLE UPDATES:

- Beginning June 16, 2027, the agency will begin implementing the AI Journey Notetaker and Coaching Certification Program in partnership with JSP. This initiative supports the agency's continued commitment to innovation, people-centered supervision, and evidence-based practices, along with consistency in case management practices.
- The Bugglegum Petunias are now placed throughout the community.
